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CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

For all purposes the duration of the event will be considered from 12 Noon MONDAY 1st October to 7pm on Friday 5th October 2018. Opening Ceremony Monday 1st October 2018 and competition from Tuesday 2nd October to Friday 5th October 2018

CONDUCT

All Chefs D'Equipe's, competitors, horse owners, employees/grooms, representatives and accompaniments are obliged, from the moment of arrival on the grounds, to acknowledge and keep within the "Code of Conduct" and Horse Welfare guidelines. Violation of this code will be dealt with by the respective Ground Jury or Appeal Committee, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the EA.

CODE OF CONDUCT

As per the Equestrian Australia 2018 National Interschool Rules, and Member Protection Policy it is expected that athletes and their support teams will adhere to the rules of the competitions in which they participate and that they will show respect for other competitors, their horses, officials, judges and administrators in their actions and their words.

There are formal mechanisms for requesting clarity of committee decisions and for disputing results. Whilst each discipline has rules and regulations specific to that discipline available for download from the EA website, the conduct of members of the sport overall is controlled by the Member Protection Policy.

There are also general competition codes of conduct that apply to ALL Interschool competitions. Breaches of these general conduct practices will result in disqualification from the competition and depending on the severity of the offence, the athlete and/or their associates may face disciplinary action.

At an Interschool event, the Organising Committee, the Technical Delegate/s, the Ground Jury and Officials are responsible for ensuring Horse Welfare guidelines and EA Codes of Conduct are observed.

The following EA Codes of Conduct must be observed by all competitors and their parents/guardians, during any activity held or sanctioned by EA – including Interschool events – or as an athlete/participant in any activity held by or under the auspices of the organisation or one of its affiliates:

For competitors
For officials
For spectators
For coaches
For administrators, directors and officers
For parents and guardians
For the welfare of the horse
FEI "Codex" for Dressage Judges

At time of entry you will be required to confirm you have read and agree to the Codes of Conduct.

Neither the Organising Committee of any event to which these rules apply nor Equestrian Australia accepts any liability for any accident, damage, injury or illness to horses, athletes, ground, spectators or any other person or property whatsoever.

Volunteers who are not EA members will be required to sign a Waiver/Release and agree to be bound by the Codes of Conduct applicable to Members of Equestrian Australia.













SMOKING

Under <u>Tobacco and Other Smoking Products (Smoke-free Places) Amendment Bill 2015</u>¹⁵ (PDF, 354kB), smoking is banned in spectator areas at public sports grounds and other recreational areas in VIC when an organised event is being held.

This ban also includes training or practice sessions to prepare for participation in an organised underage sporting event, and breaks or intervals during the course of the event, training or practice session.

RESERVATION OF RIGHTS

The Organiser reserves the right:

- To cancel any class or event
- To divide any class
- To transfer competitors between sections of a class
- To alter advertised times
- To refuse any entry, with or without stating the reason

DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY

Neither the Organising Committee, or the Stakeholders of any event to which these rules apply nor Equestrian Australia accepts any liability for any accident, damage, injury, or illness to horses, athletes, group, spectators or any person or property whatsoever.

IMAGE CONSENT

By entering the event you give your consent to Equestrian Victoria, Equestrian Australian, Interschool Victoria, Interschool Australia and Stakeholders to copy or reproduce images via streams of social media, Live & Online Broadcast, print media, and multimedia of yourself and your animals, as determined by EV without your acknowledgement of yourself and without your entitlement to any remuneration or compensation now or in the future.

GEAR CHECK

Gear Check is compulsory before each class and/or phase, but only if the phases are held on different days. EA stewards will complete the checks.

DRESS AND SADDLERY

- Riders must compete in attire required under EA rules. Jackets and ties or stocks, not school jumpers.
- Teams may coordinate state colours (e.g. ties, brow bands etc.)
- In the event of hot weather, the Organising Committee may permit riders to compete without riding coats.
- Helmets as per Article 122 EA General Regulations must be worn at all times whilst mounted http://www.equestrian.org.au/sites/default/files/Equestrian_Australia_General_Regulations_19_October_20
 16.pdf
- Back Protectors are compulsory under EA Eventing Rules.
- Random checks of helmet standards may occur.
- The Organising Committee authorises competitors (only where permitted by the State Team Manager) to carry an emblem or logo of their state team and/or of their personal sponsor on their clothing or saddlecloth. All sponsor logos may not exceed 20cm square in total on each side of the saddlecloth.

SADDLECLOTH

Saddlecloths – dressage or all-purpose must be worn. No shaped saddlecloths are permitted except in Show Horse where numnahs are permitted. Saddlecloths may have the state team logo or emblem embroidered on them, to the approved specifications and as approved by the State Team Manager.













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RIDER NUMBERS

Numbers (3 digit) will be allocated and it is the rider's responsibility to provide their own number holders/number for the bridle or the saddlecloth and must be displayed on both sides of the horse unless otherwise stated. In Show Horse classes a breastplate number holder may be used. Horses must display numbers at all times when out of stable, this requires the allocated number to be attached to the head collar (one number is sufficient) when horse is led.

Rider back numbers for the cross country phase of Eventing must be worn and will be provided to the respective State Manager. Penalty for not adhering to these rules may be disqualification.

PROTESTS, REPORTS AND APPEALS

Please refer to the EA General Regulations and the EA Codes of Conduct.

Protests must be submitted by the State Chefs D'Equipe, together with a \$250 application fee to the Event Office within 30 minutes of the publication of class results. The protest will be assessed by the Appeals Committee. Any submissions after this time will not be accepted.

Individual athletes or their parents must NOT approach the Organising Committee, any Official or the Technical Delegate with an objection – they are to work with through their nominated Chefs D'Equipe.

VETERINARY EXAMINATION AND HORSE IDENTIFICATION

These will be carried out in accordance with the Veterinary Regulations Art. 1031 and the form attached will be used to record the examination and horse details. Extracts of FEI Veterinary Regulations Article 1031. Not all clauses were relevant or included here.

Definitions:

- a) The term 'Veterinary Examination' is used to denote a clinical examination carried out by a qualified veterinarian to establish the general health status of a horse about to compete. Veterinary Examinations are also used to ensure that competition horses are not ill or injured as a result of international movement.
- b) The term 'Verification of Identity' refers to the means of checking the identity markings of the horse against its diagram in the passport at a Veterinary Examination or Horse Inspection.

The Veterinary Examination ('Examination upon Arrival') should be carried out as soon as possible after arrival, but in any case before the horse comes into contact with other horses in the event stables. Each competitor is to complete and provide the horse identification and vet check form to the nominated vet for their inspection (form attached).

The object of the Veterinary Examination is to:

- a) Verify the identity of each horse from its paperwork;
- b) Check that the animal has not been in contact with other animals suffering from infectious or contagious disease (e.g. strangles) or has come from an establishment that is not free of such disease (VR Art 1032.2); and
- c) Carry out a clinical examination to ensure that the horse is not suffering from any infectious or contagious disease. This examination may include the palpation of limbs and body, monitoring heart and respiratory rate, body temperature and any other pertinent clinical parameters necessary. The limbs may be palpated or lifted to examine a suspected abnormality. However, an examination for any lameness (i.e.flexion tests or a trot-up) is not part of this examination. A record of the clinical findings must be made which should follow the horse through successive examinations and inspections.

If the veterinarian's opinion is that the horse should not be allowed to be in contact with the other participants or should not take part in the event, the case must be referred to the Ground Jury and the Veterinary Commission/Delegate for a final decision.

Following a Veterinary Examination:

a) Any horse, which is considered to be a health risk to other horses at the event, must be refused permission to enter the event stables. It may however, be stabled in separate isolation stables pending recovery or













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- until alternative arrangements have been made;
- b) Any horse, which is not considered to be fit to participate in the event, must be reported to the Ground Jury. The Veterinary Commission/Delegate should discuss the case with the Ground Jury which is responsible for making the decision, if necessary, to eliminate the horse before the First Horse Inspection;
- c) Mares may not compete after their fourth month of pregnancy or with a foal at foot. If it is subsequently confirmed that a mare competed under either of these conditions, she will be disqualified from all events to which these conditions applied and the Person Responsible will be referred to the Secretary General for reference to the Judicial Committee;
- d) Horses may not compete with a tracheotomy (i.e. a surgical opening through the skin into the trachea) or after aneurectomy has been carried out;
- e) Tongue straps or guards for horses are not permitted in any FEI competitions; and
- f) Shock wave therapy (i.e. Extra-Corporal Shockwave, ESWT) and Cryo-therapy are not permitted during competition and for a period of five days prior to the first Horse Inspection. The application of ice is acceptable.

HORSE IDENTITY DOCUMENTATION

Horses do not require an FEI Passport but MUST have their EA Registration papers in order to compete.

SAMPLING FOR PROHIBITED SUBSTANCES

Medication control sampling (swabbing) is compulsory at all Australian Interschool Championships. A minimum of three horses or 3% of horses taking part (whichever is the greater) will be sampled.

Competitors should refer to the EA Equine Anti-Doping and Medication Control Rules (http://www.equestrian.org.au/medication-control) and discuss any treatment for their horses with their veterinarian.

APPROVED LABORATORY

An EA/FEI Approved Laboratory will carry out analyses on samples collected at this event

VETERINARIANS

Upon arrival on the show grounds all veterinarians are requested to announce their presence at the office of the official show veterinarian in the stable area, after having received their official pass at the event office.

SOUNDNESS

The Judges are required to satisfy themselves regarding soundness of all horses and under EA Sport Rules they have the authority to stop an unsound horse during the competition or from competing.













ENTRY TIMETABLE

Competitors are to be co-ordinated through their EA State Branch and any communications regarding entries or draws must be directed to your State Branch. Please do NOT contact the Organising Committee directly with any questions.

The Organising Committee reserves the right to accept or deny entries.

CLOSE OF ENTRIES: MONDAY 20th AUGUST 2018 12 noon

The names of the competitors and horses must be indicated and all entries completed online via Nominate. NZ, WA & NT riders that have not yet been allocated a Pool Horse, should state "Pool Horse" under horse name. NZ, WA & NT riders that have made private arrangements to borrow a horse must provide full details of the horse at time of entry.

POOL HORSES

The Organising Committee will make Pool Horses available for riders representing WA & NT and invited New Zealand riders only.

Riders eligible for a pool horse must lodge their 'Request for Pool Horse' form with their State Branch / Team Manager by 1th August 2018. Every endeavor will be made to appropriately match riders with pool horses.

Riders from WA & NT and invited New Zealand riders may also source a privately borrowed horse for the event and all conditions and regulations will apply to the horse as if it was a pool horse, except for payment details. Full details must be provided at time of entry. Horses arranged privately must be EA registered and their grading will be checked for eligibility. All horses must undertake a vet inspection on arrival.

Riders of Pool Horses organized by the OC will be required to pay \$600 for the use of their horse for the competition. Pool horse owners are required to provide all saddlery/rugs and equipment for their horse as well as all feed for the duration of their stay. Pool horses may be able to Day Stay at the event with prior approval but must be identified on arrival with a veterinary inspection prior to the competition.

The Pool Horse rider will be required to book and pay for all stabling fees for the horse for the duration of the event and they undertake to be responsible for the care and health of the horse whilst it is at the competition. Full details of the agreement to use a pool horse will be provided to riders and owners. Payment for pool horses will be requested upon allocation of a horse after close of entries.

Qualifying criteria for Pool Horses:

- Pool horses are not permitted for Eventing classes.
- Pool horses cannot be provided to compete in Advanced, PSG, Inter 1 dressage or 120cm jumping.
- Pool horses are only available for those competitors in NT, WA and NZ who are unable to bring their own horse to the competition.
- Pool horses will be not be provided as an additional horse; if a person has qualified on more than one horse and wishes to use a pool horse in addition and instead of their own horse for whatever reason this is not permitted.
- Pool horses will only be allowed to compete in a maximum of two classes only.
- Where a pool horse is unable to be sourced the Organising Committee will refund the entry amounts paid by the competitor.















ELIGIBILITY

Athletes must be:

- Residents of the State they are representing (or enrolled students in the state they are representing)
- Current Competitive members of Equestrian Australia
- Qualified and endorsed by their State branch.

Each State may nominate a maximum of four (4) riders per discipline/class.

Riders are to compete in classes that they have qualified for and are competent of their own and their horse's abilities. In sports where "grading" or "qualification" applies, the EA rules for eligibility must be adhered to.

The level or grade of the horse or horse/rider combination is as at the time of close of entries.

RIDERS AGE

The Australian Interschool Championships caters for athletes from primary and secondary schools across the country.

Primary competition is restricted to athletes enrolled up to and including year/grade 6 in the year of competition.

The Secondary competition is for those enrolled in year 7 to 12 inclusive in the year of competition, up to 18 years of age in the year of competition. Organising committees may, with the approval of the NIC, include Intermediate divisions in suitable classes. Intermediate is defined as those athletes enrolled in years 7, 8 and 9. Senior divisions are for those athletes enrolled in years 10, 11 and 12 in the current year.

HORSES

All horses entered in the Australian Interschool Championships must have full EA registered and a microchip meeting Australian Standard AS5018/5019 inserted. Horses must be entered for events in their full registered names and their registered EA number must be provided. Owners of horse must have current state based membership.

EA Registration papers/identification documents must be produced on arrival at the venue. Horses entered in the Championships may only be ridden and schooled by the athlete competing the horse. This applies for the entire event.

Only the nominated athlete competing in any given discipline may ride the nominated horse, on or off the grounds, for the duration of the event - horses may not leave the grounds without the permission of the Organising Committee during the Championships. Lunging by someone other than the nominated athlete is permitted where there may be a safety issue; however lunging is permitted only in specific areas.

Only competition horses are allowed on the venue. No exceptions will be made.

AGE OF HORSES

All horses and ponies must be four years of age or older to compete in Interschool competitions. Horses' ages are assessed from 1 August of the year of birth.

NUMBER OF HORSES/CLASSES PER ATHELETE

Athletes may compete with more than one horse and in multiple disciplines, as long as National Discipline Rules are followed regarding the number of test/classes that may be contested.

Interstate riders may compete with more than one horse and in multiple disciplines with a **recommendation of two classes per rider, or a maximum of three classes**. However, the OC may request the rider to make a choice where three classes cannot be accommodated for scheduling or horse welfare considerations.

Victorian riders who have qualified for more than one discipline (either on separate horses or the same horse) shall be permitted to enter a **maximum of two classes per rider** in the interests of allowing higher levels of team participants.

NOTE:- Primary and Secondary school riders that choose to compete in eventing are ineligible to compete in Combined Training on the same horse.















It is the responsibility of the Chefs D'Equipe to ensure that discipline rules are followed and those riders with multiple horses are able to compete without the question of any welfare issues arising. This should be done before they enter the competition in consultation with team members. Once all entries are closed each State Chefs D'Equipe will receive a list for review.

NEW ZEALAND RIDERS

The Organising Committee via Equestrian Australia is inviting eight secondary school riders from New Zealand to participate in the event. These riders will be provided Pool Horses or may make private arrangements to borrow a horse. They will compete in Dressage and Jumping. For the purposes of scoring throughout the event NZ will be recognized as an additional state team.

CO-ORDINATION OF ENTRIES

The State EA Branch or the Chefs D'Equipe shall be responsible for coordinating the team, including substitutions and shall be responsible for verifying the eligibility of competitors and shall be able to provide evidence of eligibility to the OC of the Australian Championships upon request.

Riders are expected to remain for the duration of the event, however subject to State Team and Organizing Committee pre-event approval, some competitors may leave from Wednesday 3rd October 2018. Such requests should be submitted to the Organising Committee through your State Team Manager or Chef D'Equipe.

Entries (all class, stabling/camping fees) shall be submitted online via **Nominate** http://www.nominate.com.au either by qualified riders or by the EA State Branch or Chefs D'Equipe depending on the process agreed by each State. All entries must be done online:

- 1. Entries to be made online via Nominate by close of entries.
- 2. On close of entries each State will be provided a report by the OC to validate the entries received.
- 3. Where entries are received from ineligible riders these will be refunded less a \$50 administration fee.
- 4. Stable allocations and camping will be undertaken in State blocks after entries have closed. No requests will be catered for.
- Payments for pool horses will be processed separately via a payment request to the riders after close of entries.

Entries received from individual riders not endorsed via the EA State Branch will not be accepted.

ENTRY FEES

The following entry fees must be paid at time of entry and are inclusive of gst:

Show Horse: \$200 per horse per class
Eventing: \$200 per horse per class
Show Jumping: \$200 per horse per class
Dressage: \$200 per horse per class
Combined Training: \$200 per horse per class

REFUNDS AND WITHDRAWLS

A full refund less a \$50 administration fee will be arranged for any entry withdrawn prior to the close of entries.

CLASS Entry fees will **NOT** be refunded after the Close of Entries. State teams may substitute a rider as per substitution conditions.

Stabling and Camping fees will be refunded after the close of entries less a \$150 administration fee for any withdrawals but only if they are accompanied by a Medical or Veterinary Certificate and presented within 7 days.

SUBSTITUTION

After close of entries Substitutions may only be made from within the Nominated Team.

Should a nominated competitor be unable for whatever reason to compete after close of entries, the relevant State















Manager may substitute a suitably qualified competitor/horse providing the following conditions are met:

- 1. A veterinary or medical certificate must be provided to prove the qualified horse's/rider's unavailability; and
- 2. The substitute horse must be eligible for the grade/level as per EA rules.
- 3. The rider must be suitably qualified to compete in the level of competition.
- 4. Approval of the Organising Committee and the relevant EA Branch is obtained.

Substitutions may only be made up until the OFFICIAL START of the competition being 12 Noon MONDAY 1st October. No substitution will be considered after 12 noon Monday 1st October 2018.

CLASS Entry fees will NOT be refunded after the Close of Entries. State teams are responsible for arranging the class refund/payment of fees between substituted riders and the rider who has paid the entry for the class. Stabling and Camping fees for the rider that has withdrawn, will be refunded less a \$150 administration fee, only if Medical or Veterinary Certificate is presented within 7 days.

FACILITIES AND VENUE

THE LOCATION

Located 36 km or only half an hour from Melbourne (may take a little longer in peak hour traffic); Werribee Park is one of Victoria's premier tourist attractions. The park is home to Shadowfax Winery, Werribee Mansion Hotel & Spa, Werribee Golf Club, and the Werribee Open Range Zoo, as well as the National Equestrian Centre.

Avalon airport is very accessible and located only 30km from WPNEC or Melbourne Airport is 46 km.

Werribee is the closest shopping /business area and is located only 10 minutes from WPNEC. There are shopping centers, restaurants, hotels, entertainment etc.

During September, Werribee has an average high temperature of 19°C, an average low temperature of 8°C and averages 8 raining days for the month.

- Two showjumping arenas (250m x 100m)
- Warm-up areas
- Three stable blocks (accommodating up to 187 horses)
- A general purpose area which can cater for up to four polocrosse grounds measuring 146m x 255m
- A general purpose area measuring 200m x 90m
- Three sand and Two Martin Collins surface dressage arenas of 20m x 60m
- Cross country course including obstacles
- Central amenities block; including meeting rooms, toilets and showers
- Conference Rooms
- Camping Area 132 powered sites and approximately 170 unpowered sites which includes toilet/shower facilities.
- Car and float parking















In addition portable stables will be available to ensure all horses can be accommodated at WPNEC during the event, all states will be allocated some portable stables.

- Accommodation in the city of Melbourne is also an option but you need to be aware travel time can vary depending on time of day as it is 32km from WPNEC.

STABLES & CAMPING

Stables and camping will be allocated in state sections and must be booked at time of entry. Every horse must have either a stable or yard booked at time of entry. Arrangements can be made for Pool Horses to attend on a day basis if required, this should be communicated to the Pool Horse co-ordinator.

On arrival stables will be filled with shavings, on departure you do not need to clean the stable. Competitors are responsible for the daily cleaning of stables and yards and placing manure in designated areas. Stables are booked for the duration of the event as a minimum, arrival on Monday 1st October and departure on Friday 5th October, should you wish to arrive earlier or depart later you can book additional nights.

Should competitors not want to use a stable, yards can be reserved, competitors are responsible to ensure their horse is safely secured in the yard. There are sufficient yards for stabled horses to use during the day if required; these will not be reserved unless the yard fee is paid. Any competitor using a yard is responsible for cleaning it daily.

There are no refunds for late arrival or departures prior to Friday 5th October on the event minimum stay booking.

Stables \$350 for 4 nights minimum stay and includes, shavings, facility fee and cleaning on departure

Additional stable nights may be booked and are \$53 per night

Yards \$150 for duration of the event and includes 2 bags of shavings, facility fee and cleaning on

departure

Camping \$80 for 4 nights minimum stay including power, additional nights \$20 per night powered site

Camping will be allocated in state sections. There are insufficient permanent powered sites to meet the needs of the event and generator power will be used on some sites.

Each Competitor is responsible for the safety of their own Tack and personal items, spare stables if available will be allowed to be used for feed and tack storage at owner/riders own risk.

Please observe the following stable safety requirements:

- Smoking is strictly prohibited in the entire stable area
- Open fires are not permitted at WPNEC
- Horses are not to enter the designated camping areas at any time
- Stable lights will be turned off at 10 pm and are not to be turned on until at least 5.30am each day
- Gear and bedding may be placed at the front of the stables, but please ensure walkways and doors are not
 obstructed, be aware that as there is no covered walkway between the stables items left here may be
 subject to weather conditions.

Additional horses not officially participating at the Australian Championships cannot be brought to the venue















under any circumstances.

ARRIVAL AND DEPARTURE OF HORSES

- Horses must be on site and inspected into the venue by 12 Noon Monday 1st October 2018
- Arrival Days/Times are listed below:

Saturday 29th September: 12 noon to 4pm
 Sunday 30th September: 11 am to 4 pm
 Monday 1st October: 9 am to 12 Noon

- The Vet Team will be at the Venue at these times to conduct Health Checks. All Competitors who have passed the Vet Check with their horses will be issued with an official Event Wristband which will need to be worn and presented when required for the duration of the Event.
- Any horse not inspected by a Vet will not be allowed to compete.
- It is mandatory for riders to attend both the Opening and Closing ceremony. The only exception will be for Competitors with Pre-Event Approval to Depart the Venue.
- Riders are expected to remain for the duration of the event, however subject to Organising Committee preevent approval; some competitors may leave from Wednesday 3rd October 2018.
- Health declarations, biosecurity paperwork and horse registrations will be required on arrival to access WPNEC
- Earlier or later arrivals/departures may be possible for those travelling from interstate. Arrangements MUST be made with the Event Director prior to arrival
- Departure Stables must be vacated by 10am Saturday 6th October 2018 (unless prior arrangements made).
- Full arrival procedures will be provided closer to event date.

HORSE TRUCKS AND FLOATS

Parking of all vehicles and trailers is to be in the designated areas only.

Vehicles not used for camping will need to be parked in designated car park.

GOLF CARTS

Only the Organising Committee will be permitted to use Golf Carts on the venue and at the competition in an official capacity. This is due to safety/risks associated with vehicles/pedestrians and horses. Any exemption request MUST be made to the OC prior to the competition. If approved the individual will be responsible for organising their own vehicle.

BICYCLES AND MOTORISED BIKES AND SCOOTERS

Motorised bikes and scooters ARE NOT permitted.

Bicycles must not be ridden without a helmet. Parents are responsible to ensure children ride in a safe manner and do not frighten horses or leave bicycles on the ground where they may be a hazard to people or horses. No bicycles in Stable area or to be left at entrance to arenas.

STABLE SAFETY AND RISK MANAGEMENT

WPNEC has strict stable safety guidelines and risk management policy which must be adhered to and accepts no liability for the loss of, or damage to, vehicles, or any other goods or articles the full details are listed here, www.wpnec.com.au but please be aware of these important conditions

- Approved Safety Helmets must be worn at all times when riding.
- Cross Country obstacles must not be jumped.
- Riding of horses bareback is prohibited.
- Riding of rugged and/or unbridled horses is prohibited.
- Stallions must be managed in accordance with EA Stallion Safe Policy Guidlelines
- Horses are not permitted within/upon the quadrangle (between the barn and Indoor Arena 1) or in any camping areas or near pedestrian doorways.
- Bicycles are not permitted in the Indoor Arenas or any stable block. Approved helmets must be worn at all

















times.

- Bicycles are not permitted near doors designated as public entrances or exits.
- Motorcyclist riders must wear approved safety helmets and hold the appropriate licence.
- Speed limits must be adhered to at all times the speed limit at WPNEC is 10km p/h.
- Power leads must not be on the ground or over roadways.
- Construction of portable/tape yards is prohibited.
- Alcohol must not be consumed in the Indoor Arenas, unless purchased from the licensed bar located in Indoor Arena 1.
- Please observe all signs at the venue.
- Horses must be tied in a safe manner. Horses must not be tied to unattached floats, wheelie bins etc.
- No infrastructure to be erected on WPNEC grounds without written approval by management prior to the
 event
- Entry and Exit doors to Indoor Arenas are not to be obstructed at any time.
- Motorised bikes and scooters ARE NOT permitted
- If camping, agree to camp only in designated areas. Power leads must be tagged and tested, and installed
 in a safe manner and must not cross roads or paths
- Must ensure persons under the age of 18 are supervised by an adult at all times
- Must report all incidents, accidents and damages to WPNEC venue management

WPNEC may refuse admission to, or cause to be removed from, the venue any person that is, in the opinion of OC are, intoxicated or any person that fails to abide with these conditions of entry or any other written signage at the WPNEC. Persons must not remain on any part of the WPNEC after having been requested to leave.

DOGS

Werribee Park National Equestrian Centre Committee of Management considers it a privilege that you are allowed to bring your dog to this venue. We insist you keep your dog under effective control at all times. Dogs must not be in the Indoor arenas during competition time or warm-up arenas. Owners are responsible to clean up after their dogs.

SMOKE FREE

Smoke Free Areas (NO SMOKING) ALL THE TIME:

- All buildings;
- The stable complex's;
- Indoor arena;
- Event / Trade square;
- All arena fields of play:
- Smoking should be 4 meters from a doorway / entries exit from any building.

Smoke Free Areas during events, clinics and including warm up:

- Main Arena seated area covered and uncovered;
- Any portable grandstands.

Additional smoking guidelines;

- A smoker cannot smoke in spectator areas and will be asked to move from that area if the cigarette smoke
 is affecting other non-smokers. e.g. If a smoker is standing on the fence of the training area and there are
 other people and children within breathing distance of the smoke they should be asked to move away
 from that area;
- If a smoker is on the cross country course with other people who are smoking and the smoke is not affecting other spectators or competitors, they can stay in that location and smoke. Electronic Cigarettes are to be treated the same as cigars, cigarettes and pipes etc.

HENDRA POLICY

The OC encourages Hendra Virus vaccination of all horses from (i.e. that normally reside/compete/train) the specifically designated "EA Known Hendra Virus Endemic Regions of Northern NSW and QLD".















It is an Equestrian Australia RECOMMENDATION THAT ALL OTHER HORSES are vaccinated against HEV disease before coming to the event, however it is NOT a mandatory requirement for horses that are attending horse events in Victoria to be vaccinated against Hendra.

Accordingly, the OC gives notice that, in submitting your entry to participate at this event, YOU WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO SEEK COMPENSATION OF ANY TYPE FROM THE ORGANISING COMMITTEE, EV, WPNEC OR ANY OF THEIR OFFICERS OR SERVANTS OR AGENTS, for any loss, damage or injury arising in anyway whatsoever, directly or indirectly from the presence of the Hendra virus in any horse or person attending the event or from any person or animal contracting any illness or disability, including death from the Hendra virus, whether directly or indirectly or howsoever otherwise.

A copy of current Hendra Vaccination certificate must be available on arrival at the event for those horses that are vaccinated and a Horse Health Declaration will also be required.

It is recommended that riders should consult with their Veterinarian regarding the risks and need for vaccination against HEV disease, strangles and tetnus.

PRACTISE ARENAS AND JUMPING

Practice arenas and their availability will be allocated prior to the event. The training areas are controlled by stewards and each team's Chef D'Equipe.

STEWARDING OF PRACTISE ARENAS

The Chief Steward must ensure that all practice arenas are adequately stewarded all the time that they are officially open. They must also ensure that these arenas are subject to random control when they are officially closed. In addition Chef D'Equipe's must ensure a state based representative is appointed to supervise all training sessions.

MEETING OF CHEFS D'EQUIPE

A meeting of all state Chefs D'Equipe will occur at a time to be advised on Monday 1st October 2018. A schedule of further meetings will be advised at this time.

VOLUNTEERING

This event will rely heavily on volunteers to assist in running events. The phone app Sign Up will be used to enable volunteers to select from all available jobs, those early to respond will get first preference of the jobs. The jobs will not be allocated on a state basis, every job will be available to volunteers to select from, it is















expected that all states participate.

Should all required jobs not be filled by 27th September 2018, the Volunteer Co-ordinator will allocate unfilled jobs to State teams who have not had an appropriate number of volunteers "signup". It will be the responsibility of the Chefs D'Equipe to fill these duties within their team and update helper contact name and details.

The Sign Up app will be activated soon after the draft draws are issued.

The willingness of state teams to volunteer will be considered when determining the team spirit award.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

CLASS PRIZES

Each class will receive rosettes from 1st to 6th and prizes from 1st to 3rd as a minimum.

INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONS

Individuals will receive points for in each class. Points are allocated based on the maximum possible number of competitors in each class (i.e. 28, 27, 26, 25...1). The points received in each class are totaled to decide the Champion, Reserve Champion individuals and 3rd to 6th place prizes.

Equality in class and sub class placings will be resolved for places 1st to 6th. If equality cannot be resolved, riders will be awarded equal placing and share points. For example one rider may be awarded 6th place and receive 23 points, two rides may be awarded 7th place so each will be awarded 21.5 points, then the next placed rider would be awarded 9th and 20 points. Champion points are awarded only where an athlete has completed all phases/sections of a class without elimination or disqualification.

Champions will receive a custom designed rug from Horseware Australia and custom garland. Reserve Champion will receive a custom designed prize.

CHAMPION TEAMS

When calculating a state team score, the total individual points of the top three individuals within the team are counted.

The fourth member's points (if there is a 4th member) are used only to determine the outcome in the case of a tie.

AWARDS

Tammy Rhodes Dressage Trophy: Presented to the athlete with the highest accumulated points across a level. Class champions with a minimum average higher than 60% across both tests will be considered for this award. Freestyle results are not included.

Closest to Ideal Time Eventing Trophy: Presented to the athlete who returns the closet to optimum time (under time) on the cross country with 0 jumping penalties. All Class Champions are considered for this award. Where riders have equal optimum times, the rider in the higher level competition is awarded the trophy.

Combined Training Trophy: Presented to the athlete with the fewest penalty points in Combined Training. All Class Champions are considered for this award. The rider with the lowest total is awarded the trophy. Where riders have equal points the rider in the higher level is awarded the trophy.

Finch Farms Show Jumping Trophy: Presented to the athlete with the best overall result in Show Jumping, with at least a clear round in the AM5.

Show Rider Trophy: Presented to the athlete with the least penalty points (maximum available points per class, less total points earned) in Show Hose, Show Hunter and Working Hunter championships. All Class Champions are considered for this award. Where riders have equal points the rider with the highest score in the rider phase of their class is awarded the trophy.

Special Awards: based on the highest aggregate individual championship points across all disciplines for the nominated horse/pony In the case of equality of points the horse/pony achieving the highest points in the highest level class will be declared winner. For Welsh and APSB awards (if applicable), pony/horse registration and owner membership details must be financial and provided at time of entry. For OTT awards, the horses registered Racing















Name must be provided

Racing Victoria Off the Track Award – To be awarded to the best performed Off the Track Thoroughbred in the disciplines of Combined Training, Dressage, Show Jumping, Eventing and Show Horse. Horses must be nominated for this award at time of entry and the horses racing name and racing history provided.

Effective from 1 August 2018, any thoroughbred bred to race that has been Stud Book registered, either in Australia with the Australian Stud Book or internationally, will be eligible to compete in OTT classes and events in Victoria.

EA Australian Interschool Championships Teamwork Trophy: To be awarded to the state showing the best team spirit and teamwork. To be judged on the following considerations:

- Tidiness and decoration of stable area with team colours
- Team uniforms and colours worn throughout the event
- Team work helping team mates to prepare for their performances
- Team spirit supporting team mates on the sidelines
- Volunteering number of team members committed to jobs on Signup
- State Based Team challenge events throughout the competition

Please note: stables can be decorated within reason, keeping in mind horse and rider safety. Stables and stable blocks must not be permanently marked in anyway - i.e. with paint, permanent markers etc. - and all decorations must be cleaned and tidied away by the last day of competition. Fines will apply for states that do not leave their stable block in a clean and tidy manner or cause damage to the stables. Stable aisles to be kept clear at all times.

OVERALL TROPHY

The **Harry le Bherz Perpetual Trophy** will be awarded to the state with the highest accumulated points across all team riders in all classes.

PRESENTATIONS

Attendance at presentations is compulsory for all athletes receiving prizes, should an athlete not be present prizes will be forfeited. No rider substitution is allowed in prize giving ceremonies.

The Organising Committee will advise the schedule of presentations. Mounted presentations will not be held the Australian Interschool Championships however the Champion horse/rider in each class is expected to have a groom bring the horse to the presentation area to receive prize and have photographs. Competitors to wear full competition riding uniform.



- Freestyle may be ridden as a third class where riders are already competing in two classes, of may be a 2nd class if riders are only competing in one class
- Starting order will be according to a random draw
- All Dressage tests will be run in accordance with Current EA Rules in the EA Dressage Competition Rules, which can be obtained from the EA website
- PSG competitors may compete in the Advanced Freestyle
- No points are awarded for these classes and there are no points included in the teams score, there are no freestyle team awards.

Age of Riders:

- EvA80 Classes: From the beginning of the calendar year in which the rider turns 8
- EvA95 Classes: From the beginning of the calendar year in which the rider turns 8. Riders under the age of 13 must have completed three EvA80 events.
- o EvA105 Classes: From the beginning of the calendar year in which the rider reaches the age of 13.
- One Star (CNC*) Classes: From the beginning of the calendar year in which the rider turns 14 until the end of the calendar year in which the rider reaches the age of 18.
- Riders competing in Eventing are NOT able to enter the Combined Training classes.
- All horses must be 4 years of age or older
- State teams can submit up to 4 riders per class.

- Course specifications as per EA National Eventing Rules
- No Pool or borrowed horses are allowed in Eventing
- Bridle or saddle blanket number compulsory for dressage and jumping and back number for Cross Country.

SCORING

According to EA National Eventing Rules. The winner is the competitor with the lowest total of penalty points.

According to EA Eventing Rule 20, In the case of a tie, the winner or place-getter will be the one with the best cross-country obstacle score (total of jumping and time penalties). If there is still a tie, the winner or place-getter will be the one whose cross-country time was the closest to the optimum time. If there is still equality, the classification will be decided in favour of the competitor with the best score in the jumping test (time and obstacles). If there is still equality, the classification will be decided in favour with the best time (fastest) in the Jumping test. If there is still equality the classification will be decided in favour of the competitor with the best percentage score in the Dressage test. If there is still equality, the tie will remain in the Final Classification.

- Age of Riders: as per National IS rules and specific Equestrian Australia Sport rules
- Riders competing in Combined Training classes are not eligible to compete in Eventing classes.
- Dressage Test to be ridden from memory. No Callers allowed.
- Dress and Saddlery: According to EA National Eventing Rules
- Scoring Method: According to EA Eventing Rule Annex I
- Starting order by random draw for dressage and jumping will be in reverse order of placings after the dressage
- Course Specifications as per EA National Eventing Rules
- Bridle or saddle blanket number compulsory for dressage and jumping
- Riders are only permitted to compete in one level per horse.
- The same horse and rider combination must complete both phases of the competition. Elimination from one phase involves elimination from the competition.
- No whip is allowed in the dressage phase, however whips of no more than 75cm are allowed in the jumping phase.

SCORING

Scoring Method: According to EA Eventing Rules

- As combined training runs under Eventing rules, riders are placed based on the number of penalties they incur
 over the 2 phases. This means that the rider with the least penalties when penalties from the dressage and
 jumping phases are added will be the winner. Dressage penalties are calculated by subtracting the average
 percentage from 100 and multiplying it by 1.5. The result is always rounded to one decimal point. Jumping
 penalties are calculated in the normal manner as per Eventing Jumping Rules. 1 penalty per second over time.
- In the case of tied scores for placings in a class the rider with the best dressage score (least penalties) will be the higher placed. If equality still exists, the closest to the optimum time (under the time set) in the jumping element will be the higher placed. If there is still a tie, then the placings will be shared and the subsequent place not awarded. For example, if there is a tie for second place then no third place will be awarded and the points for second and third will be added together and then divided equally between the two tied riders.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- The Jumping competition will be conducted under the National Sporting Rules for Jumping
- · Horses must be 4 years of age or older
- Riders may compete in consecutive heights.
- Saddlery as per EA National Jumping Rules
- Course inspections are only permitted during designated times in the official riding dress. Jumping courses
 will be open for inspection prior to the start of the competitions and re-opened between each class for
 approximately 15 minutes
- Riders must ride in the order of the draw and must not hold up proceedings on the day.
- Course plans will be posted at the entry gate

JUMPING CLASSES

Phase 1 -One Round Table A (Also called A2) Article 238.2.1

Athletes with equality of penalties for any place are placed in accordance with the time taken to complete the round. In the event of equality of penalties and time for first place, there may be a jump-off over a shortened course over obstacles, which may be increased in height and/or spread in accordance with the provisions of the schedule. Please note- this is only if faults and times are exactly the same so is very rare that this second round jump off is ever run.

Phase 2 - Two-Phase Article 274 5.3

This competition comprises two phases run without interruption, each at an identical or different speed, the finishing line for the first phase being identical with the starting line for the second phase.

Phase 3 - AM5 Article 238.2.2

This is a competition not against the clock, but in the event of equality of penalties for first place, there will be one jump-off against the clock. Other athletes are placed according to their penalties and time in the first round. All Riders who Jump Clear in the first round will be invited back to complete the second round at a raised height (approx. 5cm).

The first phase is a course of 7 to 9 obstacles with or without combinations (Table A against the clock). The second phase takes place over 4 to 6 obstacles, which may include one combination (Table A against the clock).

Athletes penalized in the first phase are halted by ringing the bell after they have jumped the last obstacle or when the time allowed for the first phase has been exceeded, after crossing the finishing line of the first phase. They must stop after crossing the first finishing line. Placing is according to the penalties and time in the second phase and, if necessary, to the penalties and time in the first phase. Athletes stopped after the first phase may only be placed after athletes who have taken part in both phases. In the event of equality for first place, the tied athletes will be placed equal first.















MISCELLANEOUS

OBJECTIONS/COMPLAINTS

No competitors or parents are to directly approach any judges, stewards, course designers or any other officials or volunteers with disputes complaints or queries.

PROTESTS PERTAINING TO THE APPLICATION OF COMPETITION RULES AND CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- Protests may be lodged against any person or body involved in any capacity in an Event or otherwise subject to
 the jurisdiction of the EA including for failure to observe the Constitution and By-Laws, Regulations or Rules or
 violation of the common principles of behavior, fairness, or accepted standards of sportsmanship, whether
 occurring during or in connection with an EA event or at any other time
- 2. Protests must be lodged with the Organising Committee for attention of the Appeal Committee during its period of jurisdiction for failing to observe the Constitution and By-Laws, Regulations or Rules in the organisation or conduct of a competition, including the matters referred to in paragraph 4 below.
- 3. Protests must be in writing, signed by the authorised person making the protest, and presented personally by the Chefs D'Equipe with a fee of \$250 together with any supporting evidence and the names of witnesses.
- 4. Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, protests against any of the following matters may only be lodged with the Ground Jury and within the following time limits:
 - a) Protests concerning the eligibility of a competitor or horse or to the conditions of the arena: not later than 30 minutes before the start of the relevant competition;
 - b) Protests concerning an obstacle, or the plan or length of the course for a jumping competition: not later than 15 minutes before the start of the competition; and
 - c) Protests concerning irregularities or incidents during a competition, or the classification of a competition: not later than 30 minutes after the announcement of the results.

COMPLAINTS REGARDING ABUSE OF HORSES OR PERSONS

Mistreatment of a horse, a competitor or an official should be reported immediately to the Organising Committee for attention of the Ground Jury who will take appropriate action on the day and will, if deemed necessary, refer the matter to the EA State Branch Manager of the relevant EA State Branch in accordance with EA Disciplinary By-Laws.

ABUSE OF THE HORSE

No person may abuse a horse during an event or at any other time. "Abuse" means an action or omission which causes or is likely to cause pain or unnecessary discomfort to a horse, including without limitation any of the following:

- To whip or beat a horse excessively
- To subject a horse to any kind of electric shock device;
- To use spurs excessively or persistently;
- To jab the horse in the mouth with the bit or any other device;
- To compete using an exhausted, lame or injured horse;
- To "rap" a horse
- To abnormally sensitise or de-sensitise any part of a horse;
- To leave a horse without adequate food, drink or exercise;
- To use any device or equipment which cause excessive pain to the horse upon knocking down an obstacle

Any person witnessing an abuse must report it in the form of a protest without delay. Persons witnessing an abuse should where possible endeavor to stop the Abuse.

EVENT ORGANISATION

In exceptional circumstances, with the approval of the Chefs D'Equipe and the Ground Jury, the OC reserves the right to modify the schedule in order to clarify any matters arising from an omission or due to unforeseen circumstances. Any such changes must be notified to all competitors and officials as soon as possible and they















must be reported to the EA by the Event Director.

CANCELLATION OF EVENT

If special circumstances demand it, the OC reserves the right to take all necessary actions including the cancellation of the event by repaying the entry fee, with the approval of the EA.

EVENT IMAGES

The OC reserves the right, to make use of all photographs, images and videos made on behalf of the OC during the event or on the show grounds for their own commercial purposes, without explicit consent of the person/competitor illustrated.

EVENT COMMUNICATION
