Daylesford & District Agricultural Society Inc. History

In 1865, the first Show was held in the Jamison Hotel Yard and was called 'The Grain Show.' Later it became known as the 'Agricultural Show', and for a considerable time was held in the old showgrounds at the corner of Malmsbury Road and Knox Street, and later at the grounds known as Middleton Park. The Daylesford Show is a traditional rural agricultural show and has been held at the Daylesford Showgrounds at Victoria Park since 1946

Unfortunately, there was no Show in 2020 or 2021 due to the Covid pandemic. and there were no animal events at the 2022 Show due to wet ground conditions.

GENERAL COMPETITION REGULATIONS

Daylesford & District Agricultural Show will run under VAS Ltd 2023 Rules & Guidelines. A copy is available in the Secretary's Office.

Intending exhibitors are requested to carefully read the rules relating to entries, particularly as to the Section and Class in which they propose to exhibit.

- ENTRIES must be lodged online at <u>www.daylesfordshow.com</u> or be with the Secretary no later than Friday November 17th 2023. Postal address: Secretary, Daylesford & District Agricultural Society, PO Box 58, Daylesford, 3460
- 2. Entries without entry fees will not be processed.
- 3. Exhibitors and stall holders are to pay admission.
- 4. The Committee reserves the right to alter, delete from or add to this schedule as circumstances arise.
- 5. The Committee reserves the right to refuse or cancel any entry without giving reasons for so doing.
- 6. No judge shall be an exhibitor in that Section in which he/she is judging.
- Judges will be distinguished by a Judge ribbon or badge and stewards by a Steward ribbon or badge.
- An exhibitor's age is their age on the day of the Show. Proof may be requested.
- District radius will be 25km from the Daylesford Post Office.
- 10. All exhibits shall be owned by the exhibitor, who may be required to lodge with the Secretary a certificate to that effect. Should it be proved to the satisfaction of the Committee that an animal or any other exhibit has been entered under a false name, pedigree, or description for the purpose of misleading the Committee or judges, the violation by an exhibitor of any one of the regulations will involve the forfeiture of the prize awarded him/her. Proof of ownership is to rest with the exhibitor. All stock exhibits must be of the breed as entered or no prize will be awarded.
- 11. Stewards have the right to re-classify an article if it is obviously entered in the wrong class.
- 12. The judge's decision will be final. No protest regarding an exhibit or a judge's decision will be entertained unless made in writing and lodged with the Secretary within one hour of judging, together with \$50, which will be forfeited if the protest is considered frivolous.
- Judges may award a second prize or may withhold any prize altogether where there is only one exhibitor or where the exhibits are not deemed worthy of prizes.
- 14. All exhibitors and their associates must behave in an appropriate manner towards judges, stewards, show organisers and other exhibitors at all times. Abusive behaviour will not be tolerated. Any inappropriate behaviour will result in removal from the venue and forfeiture of any prizes awarded.
- 15. Any person refusing to attach a ribbon or prize card on any exhibit to which the prize is awarded and to keep the same on during the hours of exhibition will, on proof thereof to the Committee, be disqualified from receiving all prizes awarded to the said person during the Show.

- Ribbons are awarded to third place in all livestock events.
- 17. Aggregate points: see relevant sections.
- 18. Water will be provided for livestock.
- 19. Biosecurity. The submission of an entry form shall be taken as a guarantee that any animal brought on to the showgrounds is free from disease as far as is known to the owner. In the case of infectious disease being spread through or by an exhibitor, the exhibitor shall be held responsible for any loss or damage caused.
- 20. The Society will not be responsible for any accident that may be caused through or by any exhibit and it will be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall not hold the Society responsible and indemnify it against any legal proceedings arising from such an accident.
- 21. If an animal breaks loose and causes damage to another animal, person or property it is the responsibility of the owner of that animal to have insurance to cover the damage. Farm insurance covers animals at the Show if the farmer informs their insurance company that they take animals to the Show.
- 22. The Society will not, in any circumstance, hold itself responsible for any loss or mis-delivery of livestock or other exhibits at the Society's exhibition or any loss or damage thereto, nor for any loss by accident, fire, storm, damage by water, flood or lightning. Exhibits and displays will be accepted only on this condition.
- 23. No exhibit can be removed from the venue until 3 p.m. on the day of the Show.
- 24. No person who is in arrears regarding entry fees, subscriptions, or any other show charge is eligible to compete at any show held by or affiliated with VAS Ltd. Proof of payment will be required before any restriction will be lifted. NOTE: not only is the above a rule of VAS Ltd but it is expected that this policy will be followed by every member and affiliated organisation.
- 25. Any prize or prizes awarded by the Society to persons at any of its exhibitions and left unclaimed for three months may be forfeited or cancelled by the Committee.
- 26. In the case of a dispute as to the construction of any of these regulations, the same will be determined by the Committee of this Society, whose decision will be final.

SECTION B – HORSES

Horse Program is conducted under Rules & Guidelines of VAS Ltd 2023 for Hacks, Galloways, Ponies & Breed Classes.

Rings 1-3 run a 3-Ring Horse Program

- Horse competitors are required to sign a waiver at the time of entry.
- 2. No stallions permitted in Rings 1, 2 and 3.
- Official stallion discs should be worn in other rings.
- 4. Stallions to be ridden only where explicitly stated and when not handled or ridden should be double tied.
- All hacks, Galloways and ponies should hold a current RASV or EV height certificate. In the event of a dispute,

- horses will be measured by the official measuring steward.
- 6. All horses' ages are from August 1.
- All riders must wear an Australian Standard approved helmet, with harness secured at all times, while riding on the showgrounds.
- 8. No long boots in riding events under 18 years.
- 9. Once judging has commenced no further competitors may come into the ring.
- If a rider falls off, he/she will not be allowed to remount until checked by medical personnel.
- 11. The use of tranquillisers, stimulants or any drugs capable of affecting the performance or behaviour of animals is forbidden. Random swabbing may take place and is at the owner's expense.
- 12. A competitor who wins a Championship in an Open Saddle class in Rings 1, 2 and 3 shall not enter the equivalent class in another ring.
- NOVICE Not to have won a first prize, competing singly, in open competition in any agricultural show. (A win in a novice class does not prevent entry.)
- 14. Show Hunters cannot compete in both Open and Show Hunter classes. It is one or the other. The term "Show Hunter" means ponies and hacks with a little more substance than is required for a show horse. A quality animal with bold, free movement and reliable temperament. A gallop may be required. The outfit for the show hunter classes is more subdued than that of usual saddle classes. Saddlery should be clean, neat and plain. There should be no coloured browbands. Riders' dress should be plain, with no hair ribbons or flowers.
- 15. VAS Ltd Off the Track Ridden Open Series Class 11 and VAS LTD Off the Track Ridden Show Hunter Series Class 15A Open to any thoroughbred horse, bred to race, that has been stud book registered, either domestically with the Australian Stud Book or internationally. Registrations will be checked by VAS Ltd office. Racing name to be used where appropriate. Riders to be 12 years and over on the day of the qualifying Show. To be judged as a good example of an Off the Track Thoroughbred (rather than a riding horse/hunter type.)

Show level – sash and \$50 prize money sent by VAS Ltd. (Both classes.) For further information visit VAS Ltd website.

16. VAS Ltd GOOD HANDS COMPETITION

Class 48 – boy or girl rider, 10 years and under 15 years on the day of the Show. The class will be judged solely on riding ability. Mount, saddle and costume will not be considered. Special attention will be paid to hands and seat, general management and control of the horse or pony. Competitors must ride using an ordinary snaffle, single jointed in the centre. The mouthpiece must be smooth and of the same type of metal with or without a cavesson noseband. A gear check may take place. Straight bar snaffles, drop nosebands, whips and spurs are not allowed. The winner qualifies for the 2024 VAS Ltd Saddle Horse Championships. Free entry. Sponsored by Sporthorse Saddlery.

17. Alabar HERO Series. Class 173. Open to all freeze branded Standardbreds registered with Harness Racing Australia, raced or unraced. Registrations to be verified. Registered/Racing name to be used where available. Freeze brand number must be provided. Riders to be 12 years and over on the day of the Show. No stallions or colts. To be judged as a good example of a Standardbred rather than a riding horse/hunter. For further information visit the VAS Ltd website.

The MacDonald Trophy, presented by the MacDonald family, will be awarded to the most successful individual competitor in horse sections from classes 1-102. To be won three times, not necessarily in succession.

Rules & Regulations - Rural Ambassador Award

- Open to ambassadors aged between 20 and 30 years as of the 1st of May 2024 and the finalist must reside in Victoria.
- Each Show can run a Rural Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- A maximum of 12 finalists will be eligible for the State Final with preference to all Group Final winners and each runner up of each group will be considered. If numbers exceed 12 finalist's interviews will be held at the information day to determine the remaining State Finalists.
- The State Final is held at the Melbourne Royal Show and each finalist is judged based on the criteria below.
- Each Finalist will need to supply a resume with a cover letter and a draft/copy of speech for the State Final, which will be given to the judges of the State Final.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the State Finalist will need to present at speech at the presentation luncheon. The winner will be announced at the presentation luncheon.

Judging Criteria

- Local Show Involvement (25 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- **Community Involvement (20 Points)** Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.
- General and Rural Knowledge (20 Points) Entrants must demonstrate a broad general knowledge and an awareness of Local/National Community issues. Entrant must also have an understanding of current affairs relating to rural life and industry.
- Personality & Communication Skills (20 Points) Personality Traits consistent with both the awards and the entrant's ambitions and goals will be assessed (e.g. enthusiasm, creativity, confidence, leadership). Also, entrants are expected to demonstrate effective communication skills – written, oral and interpersonal.
- Ambitions/Goals/Interests (15 Points) Each Entrants ambitions and goals will be assessed on their integrity and relevance to the award. Entrants must demonstrate steps towards achieving their goal.
- Style, Grooming & Presentation (10 Points) Entrants presentation will be assessed according to the suitability of their attire and conduct in a range of contexts.
- **Conduct (10 Points)** How the entrant behaves and demonstrates appropriate behaviour in each setting e.g. being polite, well dressed and soft spoken.
- Public Presentation (3-minute speech) (20 Points) Entrants public presentation will be assessed according to the quality of the content, delivery and the extent to which it addresses the set topic.
